BIKING

GUARANTEED RIDE HOME

Guaranteed Ride Home offers commuters in the D.C. Metro area who regularly carpool, bike, walk, or take public transit to work a free and reliable ride home when an immediate means of transportation is necessary. The program is designed as a safety net when an unexpected emergency
